## What can I do to feel better?

- To help with soreness and swelling:
  - Put a cool, wet cloth over the area where you had the needle.
  - o Move the arm or leg where you had the needle.
- If you have a fever, wear fewer layers of clothes and drink more fluids. For more information about fever, go to <u>MyHealth.Alberta.ca</u>.
- There is medicine to help with a fever or pain. Check with your doctor or pharmacist if you are not sure what medicine or dose to take. Follow the directions on the package.
- Some people with health problems, such as a weak immune system, must call their doctor if they get a fever. If you have been told to do this, call your doctor even if you think the fever is from the vaccine.

Alberta Health Services (AHS), Alberta Precision Laboratories (APL), and Covenant Healthcare Workers: Report your influenza immunization using the self-reporting form on Insite (AHS and APL) or CompassionNET (Covenant Health). If you work for more than one employer (AHS/APL and Covenant Health), please complete the Got My Flu shot form for each employer (and indicate each employer).

Do NOT complete the Got My Flu Shot form if you received your immunization at a WHS or OHS&W clinic or from a site champion.

Your influenza immunization status is used to plan, manage and allocate resources to protect patients, family and healthcare workers during the influenza season.

An electronic copy of immunizations you have had in Alberta is available for those age 14 years and older by registering for a MyHealth Records account at MyHealth.Alberta.ca/myhealthrecords.

For children who are under age 14 years, contact your local Public Health or Community Health Centre to get a copy of immunizations they have had in Alberta.
